The permit holder must abide by all campground rules and regulations. Specific standards and requirements are addressed in the Commercial Use Authorization.

### CONDITIONS OF THIS AUTHORIZATION

- 1. <u>False Information</u>: The Holder is prohibited from giving false information, to do so will be considered a breach of conditions and be grounds for revocation: [RE:36 CFR 2.32(a)(3)].
- 2. <u>Compliance</u>: The Holder shall exercise this privilege subject to the supervision of the park area Superintendent, and shall comply with all applicable laws and regulations of the area and terms and conditions of the Authorization. The Holder must acquire all permits or licenses of State or local government, as applicable, necessary to provide the services described above, and, must operate in compliance with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws and regulations, including, without limitation, all applicable park area policies, procedures and regulations. The commercial services described above are to be provided to park area visitors at reasonable rates and under operating conditions satisfactory to the park area Superintendent.
- 3. <u>Liability</u>: This Authorization is issued upon the express condition that the United States, its agents and employees shall be free from all liabilities and claims for damages and/or suits for or by reason of any injury, injuries, or death to any person or persons or property of any kind whatsoever, whether to the person or property of the (Holder), its agents or employees, or third parties, from any cause or causes whatsoever while in or upon said premises or any part thereof during the term of this agreement or occasioned by any occupancy or use of said premises or any activity carried on by the (Holder) in connection herewith, and the (Holder) hereby covenants and agrees to indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless the United States, its agents, and employees from all liabilities, charges, expenses and costs on account of or by reason of any such injuries, deaths, liabilities, claims, suits or losses however occurring or damages growing out of the same.
- 4. <u>Insurance</u>: Holder agrees to carry **commercial general liability** insurance against claims occasioned by the action or omissions of the Holder, its agents and employees in carrying out activities and operations under this authorization. The policy shall be in the amount of, not less than \$1,000,000.00 per occurrence, covering both bodily injury and property damage, and underwritten by a United States company naming the "United States of America" (National Park Service, Yosemite National Park, P.O. Box 700, El Portal, CA 95318) as "Additional Insured". Holder agrees to have on file with the park copies of the above insurance with the proper endorsements.
- 5. <u>Cost Recovery</u>: Cost incurred by the park as a result of accepting and processing the application and managing and monitoring the authorized activity will be reimbursed by the Holder. Administrative costs and estimated costs for activities on site must be paid when the Authorization is approved. If any additional costs are incurred by the park, the Holder will be billed at the conclusion of the Authorization.
- 6. <u>Benefit</u>: Neither Members of, nor Delegates to Congress, or Resident Commissioners shall be admitted to any share or part of this Authorization or derive, either directly or indirectly, any pecuniary benefit to arise therefrom: Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to any incorporated company, if the Authorization be for the benefit of such corporation.
- 7. <u>Transfer of Authorization</u>: This Authorization may not be transferred or assigned without the written consent of the park area Superintendent.
- 8. <u>Termination</u>: This Authorization may be terminated upon breach of any of the conditions herein or at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- **9**. <u>Renewal/Exclusion</u>: The Holder is not entitled to any preference to renewal of this Authorization except to the extent otherwise expressly provided by law. This Authorization is not exclusive and is not a concession contract.
- **10.** <u>Rates</u>: The commercial services described above are to be provided to park area visitors at reasonable rates and under operating conditions satisfactory to the park area superintendent.

- **11**. <u>Construction</u>: The Holder shall not construct any structures, fixtures or improvements in the park area. The Holder shall not engage in any groundbreaking activities without the express, written approval of the park area superintendent.
- 12. <u>Gross Receipts</u>: The Holder is to provide the park area superintendent upon request (and in any event, immediately after expiration of this Authorization) a statement of its gross receipts from its activities under this Authorization and any other specific information related to the Holder's operations that the park area superintendent may request, including but not limited to, visitor use statistics and resource impact assessments. (See conditions #35.)
- 13. <u>Financial Accountability</u>: The Holder is to maintain an accounting system under which its accounts can be readily identified with its system of accounts classification. This accounting system must be capable of providing the information required by this Authorization. The Holder grants the United States of America and the General Accounting Office access to its books and records at any time for the purpose of determining compliance with the terms and conditions of this Authorization.
- 14. Acknowledgement of Risk (Release of Liability): NPS policy states that operators cannot require visitors (clients) to waive their right to hold CUA holders responsible for actions. The Holder is not permitted to require clients to sign a waiver of liability statement or form, insurance disclaimer and/or indemnification agreement. The Holder is permitted to request or require clients to sign an acknowledgement of risk statement or form prior to participation. The Holder may require or request a client sign a form or statement indicating that the client has certain prerequisite skills that may be required to participate in the commercial activity. If the Holder uses an acknowledgement of risk form, a current copy of the form must be sent to the Office of Special Park Uses for written approval prior to issuance of the CUA. A CUA will not be approved if the Acknowledgement of Risk for is not approved by the park. # APPENDIX SPECIAL PARK CONDITIONS For Travel Trailer Rental & Delivery CUA

### Definitions:

<u>PERMIT/AUTHORIZATION</u>: these terms may be used interchangeably when referring to the Commercial Use Authorization.

<u>CUA</u>: Abbreviation for this permitting instrument, "Commercial Use Authorization".

<u>Holder</u>: For the purpose of this authorization the word "Holder" shall mean the person and or company whose name is listed on page one of this permit as the Holder. The Holder shall be the responsible party in matters agreed to in this authorization.

<u>Travel Trailer</u>: For the purpose of this authorization the term "Travel Trailer" or "Trailer Coach" shall mean a vehicle designed for human habitation or human occupancy and for being drawn by a motor vehicle.

<u>Campsite</u>: For the purpose of this authorization the term "Campsite" shall mean an authorized, reserved camping space within a developed campground.

- 15. <u>Proof of Authorization</u> The Holder must carry a copy of this entire CUA and be prepared to present it at all park entrances and to any National Park Service (NPS) Ranger upon request.
- 16. **Special Instructions** The Holder will comply with any special instructions received from the Superintendent, or representative thereof, concerning commercial operations within Yosemite National Park.

- 17. **Business/Revenue Limits** It is understood that the holder of this CUA shall not develop a business based on revenues generated through sales within Yosemite National Park which exceed the gross yearly earnings of \$25,000.00. Revenues exceeding the \$25,000 limit will result in the non-renewal of future CUA.
- 18. \*\* Authorized Activity The Holder is authorized to tow rented travel trailers into Yosemite National Park and deliver the trailer to reserved campsites for their client(s). The Holder may not purchase campsite reservation for their clients. The client must purchase their own reservations. Violation of this condition will result in the immediate revocation of this CUA.
- 19. <u>Condition of Travel Trailer</u> The travel trailer must be maintained in good condition. The interior must be clean and meet State Health and Safety Code standards for a commercial rental. The National Park Service reserves the right to inspect trailers delivered to park campgrounds.
- 20. <u>Maximum Length</u> Travel trailers may not exceed thirty-five feet in length. (The Holder must confirm with their client(s) that the campsite reserved will allow for the appropriate trailer length.)
- 21. <u>Towing</u> The tow vehicle must be a proper match for the travel trailer being towed. The travel trailer must not exceed the gross vehicle weight of the tow vehicle and must meet requirements set forth in the State of California Vehicle Code.
- 22. <u>Delivery of Travel Trailer</u> Employees towing travel trailers must be at least 18 years of age and have experience towing and backing the size of travel trailer being delivered. Travel trailers may only be delivered between the hours of 12 P.M. and 4 P.M. The campground Rangers must be notified of the delivery prior to the trailer being parked at the campsite. The Holder must leave a 24-hour contact phone number with the campground Ranger t in case of an emergency.
- 23. **Parking** The travel trailer may only be parked on the campsite parking pad, allowing room for the client vehicle to park at the site. The parked travel trailer must not interfere with the free flow of traffic through the campground. The trailer wheels must be chocked to prevent rolling. The Holder will be responsible for the cost of moving an illegally parked travel trailer.
- 24. Removal of Travel Trailer: The Holder must remove the travel trailer from the campground by the 12 P.M. mandatory checkout time on the scheduled date of departure. In the event that the client checks out of the campground prior to the scheduled date of departure, the Holder must removed the travel trailer upon the actual date of the client's departure. The client is responsible for setting up a method of notification with their client in the case of an early departure. In the case of a Park emergency, the Holder must be available to remove the travel trailer from the park within 12 hours of receiving notification.
- 25. <u>Emergency Contact</u> The Holder is responsible for setting up a method of notification with their client in the case of an emergency.
- 26. <u>Clean up</u> All areas used by the Holder to conduct the authorized activity must be left clean and all debris and garbage carried out of the Park for disposal.
- 27. <u>Fire Extinguisher</u> The travel trailer must be equipped with at least one dry chemical or carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) type fire extinguisher in working condition with a rating of at least 4-B.

- 28. <u>Rates</u> All rates charged to the public by the CUA Holder for commercial services authorized by this CUA shall be reasonable and appropriate for the type and quality of services required and authorized under the CUA. Rates must be submitted to the National Park Service for review.
- 29. <u>Entry Fees</u> Entrance fees are waived for the Holder only while conducting the authorized activity. Attempting to avoid payment of appropriate fees is a violation of federal law and will result in the revocation of the CUA and the Holder will be subject to criminal prosecution.
- 30. <u>Safety</u> The Holder shall take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of its clients, other Park visitors, and Park employees.
- 31. <u>Sale of Miscellaneous Items</u>: The Holder is prohibited from selling any items within the park boundary.
- 32. <u>Complaints</u> The Holder shall conduct business in a professional and courteous manner. Any person issued a CUA who is found to have displayed poor customer service, or causing complaints relative to his/her conduct may have his/her CUA suspended or revoked.

### 33. Natural, Cultural & Historic Resource Protection

To the degree that the permitted activity may impact the natural, cultural and/or historic resources of the park; the Holder shall ensure that the Park's geological, biological, historical and archeological resources are not disturbed.

## 34. Protection of Natural Resources & Cultural Artifacts (Historic and Prehistoric

The Holder will not disturb, remove, or allow clients to disturb or remove any natural and/or historic and/or cultural artifacts from the Park including arrowheads, rock mortars, glass bottles/jars or similar artifacts. Rocks, flowers, plants and parts of plants (alive or dead) as well as other natural resources may not be removed.

- 35. <u>Drugs & Alcohol</u> The Holder may not consume any alcoholic beverage or be under the influence of alcohol (BAC 0.01 or higher) and/or a controlled substance while engaged in the permitted activity. Possession and/or use of a controlled substance and/or evidence of being under the influence of alcohol (BAC 0.01 or higher) or drugs will result in the immediate termination of this CUA.
- 36. <u>Annual Survey</u> The Holder is required to complete and return the annual survey form to the Office of Special Park Uses by close of business on **January 31, 20**##. The information required by this document will include a list of locations delivered to, the total of all trailers rented, number of days trailers were used in the park and total gross receipts generated for rentals delivered in the park, along with a request to issue a permit for the following year if desired.
