

Specific proposed repairs include: in-kind replacement of cedar bark roof; replacement of certain ceiling rafter poles and support posts; installation of a drainage system to direct rain water away from activity area; resurfacing the dirt/sand floor.








Figure 1 Roundhouse Construction Diagram - Plan View




Figure 2 Round House Construction Diagram - Side View
