B. PROJECT DESCRIPTION AND BACKGROUND

Based on the results of a structural integrity evaluation performed by an engineer, temporary shoring would be installed at the lower level of the Badger Pass Day Lodge (in locker areas B and C and under the outside sun decks located along the meadow side of the building; see Attachment A, Map 2) to relieve excessive loads on deteriorated support structures (see photos, Attachment C). This temporary shoring would be left in place for up to several winter seasons until permanent structural repairs can be completed.

Per the design provided by T-Squared Architects (see Attachment B), the deck shoring would consist of screw operated metal shoring jacks, set on 8" x 2" x 3/16" steel channels at ± 72 " on center, with 6" x 8" #1 Douglas fir wood beams set on top of the jacks and run continuous along the entire length of the sun deck's outer edges, supporting the existing timber deck. The existing lockers would be removed temporarily to install the shoring, and then placed back in front of the shoring. This would eliminate interference with the use of the lockers and better protect the shoring from damage or vandalism.








Figure 1 Design drawing of proposed shoring provided by T² Architects)




